And what Allyson is gonna do is just give you a briefing of these two documents. And these are just work plans. This isn't actually the work that has been completed; this is a work plan to tell you what we are planning to do. And, you know, after this meeting, you can take the time to review that for yourself.

that -- that our legal office is saying that we have

to do in accordance with federal regulations. In doing so, it is taking time. I can't come up with any kind of excuses. They are just taking time with their reviews. And I have not received another RI/FS to submit to you guys.

Also, I just found out today that Picatinny's website have been hacked and that -- not only the environmental website has been hacked, but their whole Army website. Like I said, I just found out this afternoon about that. And what I am planning is I'm gonna have clerical support from Parsons to come down from Boston who will -- well, she's coming to do several things. But one of the things she's gonna be doing is going to the library to ensure that all CDs that we have given to them are still there. And anything that's missing, we will make sure that it is replaced. Because now, that will be the only way that the public -- until Picatinny figures out how to restore their website, that will be the only way that the public can receive the documents.

Also, this may be my last RAB. I have just received an offer from Naval Facilities
Engineering Command in California, and I am taking it.

Whatever he would like to do himself. 21 22 So I just summarized as to why we have exceedances and what our future plans are. 23 24 And basically we know that there are exceedances at M-68, which is Building 700, because 25

when we had the pump-and-treat system going on at 699, we started drawing and getting exceedances for PCEs, which should have -- should not have been, because that was a gas station, so we shouldn't be getting PCEs. So we did an investigation, and we found that Building 700 used to be Building 565 before they demolished that. It was a liquor store, and then before that, it was a dry cleaners. Then we found out that they had a UST that had PCE in it, dry cleaning chemicals, in it. And when we had the pump-and-treat system on, it was pulling the contaminant towards Building 699, M-53. So that's why you were able to get that.

And what I summarized for them is that their -- they were concerned because there are high TCEs. When we closed is when we found this all out. So we have not completed the remedial investigation at this site, because we have to get an RI/FS completed for this site. And what we've been doing is continuously monitoring the groundwater on a quarterly basis. And the reason why you see the monitoring well 565-01 and 565 monitoring well 01D are -- are so high above the TCE is because they only removed the tank and they removed what looked like wet salt. So they haven't done a complete

Page 34 delineation and cleanup at that site, but that is 1 2 proposed. What's important to note, and what's 3 important for you when you go to give your 4 5 presentation, is that, you look at what is downgradient. When you look at the downgradient 6 wells, which are 699, monitoring well 09 and -- and 7 16, you will see that they are well below the state 8 criteria. So we know from that that the contaminant 9 10 or the plume is not spreading and is not migrating out and potentially going into Oceanport residents. 11 12 And that's what -- that was their concern. 13 MR.
